**Project Overview:** Wildlife ACT is a purely research based organization that works within several large reserves in Zululand, South Africa. They also have a couple marine conservation projects in Africa. The organization was created by several South Africans who have passion and experience in field guide and research work. This is a great organization that has ties to many large conservation organizations like WWF, Panthera, and has won a few awards for responsible tourism and are Fair Trade certified.

There are several things you can do with Wildlife ACT, from volunteering to internships and taking courses. As a volunteer, the only project available is research and field work. This ranges in activities from wildlife monitoring to collaring and game counts. These projects take place within the reserves, so you not only work in the reserves but you live in them too during your stay. The groups are kept small, only 5 total volunteers are taken in one reserve at one time, so that you can expect a very personal experience.

This website is very informative and though. There is a breakdown of exactly how your money is spent and what to expect when volunteering.

Is it Conservation?: Yes. This is purely research of wildlife in their natural habitat.
